



Quechan Tribe's Fitch Rating Now Positive

from Fitch Ratings, an international credit rating agency that of the operations received a Statracks, analyzes & rates the performance of Native American and corporate gaming & lodging companies.

In a press release dated September 11, 2012, Fitch Ratings upgraded the Quechan financial outlook from Stable to Positive.

Alex Bumazhny, Associate Director for Fitch's Lodging and Gaming Sector writes, "The positive outlook reflects improvement in the operating performance at Quechan's gaming enterprises, reduction in debt service through refinancing and paydown of debt, and more prudent fiscal management by the Tribe."


The news followed a presentation by two members of the Tribal Council and two members of casino management to Fitch Ratings at their home offices in New York City.

Last fall, the Tribal Council factors in achieving this rating upgrade was a reduction in government spending. The Tribal Council has had to make many on cost-cutting.

operations "Our casino recently completed twenty consecutive months of yearover-year improvement in our financial results," offered Vice President Ronda Aguerro.

For the first six months of 2012, the Quechan Casino♠Resort and Paradise Casino have increased cash flow by 11% over the previous year.

This is a major accomplishment considering the national economic recession and the fact that the Imperial Valley and surrounding area is plagued with one of the highest unemployment rates in the US.

In addition to the gains made by the two casinos, the Tribe has achieved three other very important financial goals in 2012.

Council Member Cyndee Miller shared, "the majority of

inter-tribal loans carry a very high interest rate of 15%, which means the longer it takes to pay off this debt, the more we are going to pay in interest. As a Tribal Council, we believe strongly that the sooner we can get these high-interest debts paid off, the better it will be for our membership."

Earlier this year, the Quechan Tribe successfully paid off the inter-tribal loans from the Morongo Band of Missions Indians and the Laguna Pueblo of New Mexico. In addition, the Tribe was able to refinance some of the bonds that were issued in 2008, effectively reducing that interest rate by 35%.

The next step in Tribal Council's financial management plan calls for refinancing the Tribe's remaining debt that has a 15% interest rate while rebuilding Tribal cash reserves.

Council Member Miller said, "We are on track for refinancing at a much lower interest rate and rebuilding Tribal cash reserves which will further strengthen One of the most important the Tribe's bonds and the two the Tribe's financial position."

Yuma Parks: Fun Runs'Til Spring

Last Friday evening, October 5th, hundreds of locals gathered at the Yuma West Wetlands Park for the first of six "Fast Feet" 5K & 10K Fun Runs and 5K Fun Walks. The Moonlight Run left the West Wetlands Park at 12th Avenue and 1st Street at 6:30 in the evening and followed a series of running paths along the Colorado Riverfront to end up back at the Park.

The next race in the series, the "Turkey Trot" will start and finish at the Gateway Park at 1st and Gila Streets on Saturday, November 17, 2012.

Yuma Parks and Recreation is able to offer the series of 5K and 10K Runs and Walks through grant support from the Foundation of Yuma Regional Medical Center. The current series with the "March On City" Final, on March 9th, 2013.

To help encourage youth to become active, be healthy, and to start a running program, the first 100 Yuma school children in grades kindergarten through eighth who register in each of the next five runs during the pre-registration period will be able to participate for FREE. However, participants may register for only one race at a time, so those who wish to take part will need to submit a separate application (reproduced at right) for each run.

Tribal Member to Attend Canonization in Rome

Tiffany Loera is a Quechan Tribal member and a dedicated Catholic who lives in Los Angeles, California. The daughter of Jesse and Terry Loera, Tiffany's maternal grandmother was Della Cachora Padilla and her great grandfather was Alexander Mark Cachora.

She attended catholic school for 12 years, first at Santa Teresita grammar school, then graduating from San Gabriel Mission High. After high school, she completed a course of study at Newbridge College, and earned a degree as a phlebotomist. She now has a successful career with a huge medical group, verifying people's insurance coverage.

Still, as an adult, she often realized that there is more to life than just going to work and earning a living. "I feel that, thanks to my schooling and a strong family base, I had a strong catholic upbringing," she says. "After my grandmother passed, her best friend had the director of the City of The Angels Kateri Circle, which is dedicated to raising awareness of Blessed Kateri and following in her footsteps."

Blessed Kateri was Kateri Tekakwitha, the daughter of a Mohawk chief, and a Roman Catholic Algonquin who had been adopted into the tribe after capture. Born in present-day New York, she survived smallpox and was orphaned as a child, then baptized as a Roman Catholic and settled for the last years of her life at a Jesuit mission village south of Montreal.

Blessed Kateri professed a vow of virginity until her death at the age of 24. At the age of 20, on Easter Sunday, April 18, 1676, she was judged as ready for "true conversion" and bap-

She will be the first Native American in history to be canonized a Saint by Pope Benedict XVI on Sunday, October 21, 2012. Years ago, her grandmother's friend had invited her to a Native American mass at St. Marcelinus in the City of Commerce. "We continued meeting together," she tells the Quechan News, "and in about 2008, I joined the Kateri Circle, too, and I've been a part of it ever since."

"I believe I was invited to ioin the circle at a time when I needed guidance." At that point in her life, things had not been going well and she was not feeling complete. "I was brought into the group to celebrate my heritage, history and my own self, and it really has lifted me up." She says the decision was an easy one: "Everyone was so welcoming! I don't think I can ever get tired of people telling me they love me!"

At 31, Tiffany is the youngest member of the group, which allows her the opportunity to bridge that gap between age groups. "I love going to all their events and listening to the stories people tell me of the miracles Kateri has done for them."

"One of the events we are

a part of is the Annual Native American Heritage Month kick off at the L.A. City Hall. This year, we were able to meet the mayor. We also support the Native American Chamber of Commerce scholarship and luncheon. At those events, I have met many native business owners and seen them help our community by providing money for college students."

Those connections have allowed her to see many more possibilities in life, and caused her to make a commitment to be there to witness the canonization in person.

"I am extremely excited to be fortunate enough to travel to Rome and be one of thousands to attend the canonization ceremony under Pope Benedict XVI. I am lucky to be able to have this happen in my lifetime, since there will never be another first native canonized," Tiffany enthuses.

She will depart from LAX on a British Airways flight to Rome on Tuesday, October 16th for a full week in Italy. "I believe I will have to land in New York before I connect to Rome," she begins, describing her travel plans. While in Rome, she hopes to attend mass at the Basilica of Santa Maria Degli Angeli and see the famous Trevi Fountain on Friday.

The weekend will be filled with visits to her favorite museums of the Vatican, including the Sistine Chapel. Those sightseeing trips will help prepare her for the sights and sounds of Sunday, when Tiffany and her group will be in the crowd at the long awaited canonization of their favorite Saint, Kateri Tekakwitha.



Battle For The Cash: That's a Fact!




